

A PRETTY WEDDING IN BOSTON.

BOSTON, April 18.—Harcourt Amory, the treasurer of the Lancaster Mills, and Miss Gertrude, daughter of George B. Chase of Beacon Street, were married to-day in Emmanuel Church. The church was filled with representative people of Boston, Brookline, and other places, among whom were a considerable number of New-Yorkers. The church chancel was elaborately decorated, a central grouping of lilies, hydrangeas, and other flowers being relieved with palms and potted plants in the background. The guests on their arrival were shown to seats by the ushers, Messrs. J. M. Meredith, Arthur Amery, Gordon Dexter, E. C. Lee, Holker W. Abbott, Arthur Chase, and Henry Waenwright, all of Boston, and Clement March of New York. At the hour appointed the bridal party entered the church to the march from "Lohengrin." The bride wore a gown of white satin, with high corsage and cut en train, ornamented with rare old duchesse lace, a family heirloom. Her veil was caught up with orange blossoms, and a handsome diamond star sparkled at the corsage. She carried a bouquet of bride's roses. The bridesmaids were Miss Elsie Crowninshield and Miss Dwight. Their dresses were of cream silk and they carried Jacqueminot roses. The ceremony was performed by the Rev.
